• Edvard Munch (December 12, 1863 -January 23, 1944) was a Norwegian Symbolist painter, printmaker, and an important forerunner of expressionistic art. His best-known composition, The Scream is one of the pieces in a series titled The Frieze of Life, in which Munch explored the themes of life, love, fear, death, and melancholy.

The Scream Facts

- It's not the figure in the painting that is doing the screaming - it's the landscape that surrounds the figure.
- The Scream is in fact a self-portrait expressing Munch's own agoraphobia.
 Walking with a couple of friends (they're in the painting) he fell behind and was overcome by his fear of open spaces.

 The pose is borrowed from a Peruvian mummy that Munch had seen at the Trocadero exhibition in Paris.

 The Scream has been the target of several highprofile <u>art thefts</u>. In 1994, the version in the National Gallery was stolen. It was recovered several months later.


