
















What a Wonderful World! Round and Round

<p>Aim: To name and locate the world's seven continents and five oceans;</p> <p>To use world maps, atlases and globes to identify the UK and its countries, as well as the countries, continents and oceans at this key stage.</p> <p>In the context of the geography of the world.</p> <p>I can name and locate the continents and oceans of the world.</p>	<p>Success Criteria: I can say the names of the 7 continents of the world. I can begin to name 2-3 of the world's oceans. I can use an atlas to locate the continents and oceans of the world. I can label a world map accurately.</p>	<p>Resources: Lesson Pack</p> <p>Globe - for small group work</p> <p>Collection of spherical objects (large and small).</p> <p>Range of coloured pencils / felt tips</p>
	<p>Key/New Words: World map, continent, ocean, equator, Northern Hemisphere, Southern Hemisphere, Asia, Africa, North America, South America, Australia, Europe, Antarctica, Atlantic, Pacific, Indian, Arctic Ocean, Antarctic Ocean, land, sea, sphere.</p>	<p>Preparation: Mapping The World Activity Sheet - as required</p>

Prior Learning: It will be helpful if children have prior understanding of the countries that make the United Kingdom and the major waters surrounding the island. They should also be familiar with using atlases, globes, maps, compass directions and the Equator from Year 1.

Learning Sequence

	<p>What Do I Know Already? Children complete the quiz independently on mini whiteboards or in Geography books. (Pre-learning assessment quiz to check existing knowledge) <i>Assess prior knowledge and understanding via discussion and answers on mini whiteboards</i></p>	
	<p>Our Wonderful Word: Show the satellite images of the world using the Lesson Presentation. What can you see? Highlight land, sea and continents visible. Show the world map or use the Mapping The World Presentation. <i>Do you know any continents of the world? What are the main oceans of the world?</i> Highlight the seven continents (land masses) of the world and the five oceans, ensure children understand that some continents have many countries whereas others do not, and that some are islands whereas other continents are attached to each other. Discuss the key features of the map and pinpoint children's own country. <i>What can you see? What are the green areas? Blue areas? Can you find our country? What continent is The UK in?</i></p>	
	<p>Make a Mnemonic. Children think of mnemonic to help them remember the seven continents of the world. Model an example; you could use fruit, children's names, sports, film characters or children's interests!</p>	
	<p>Round and Round: Gather children in small groups and allow them to explore the globe for a few minutes. Introduce the globe and explain that the world is round, a sphere, and show other spherical objects large and small to illustrate. (Ensure children understand this). <i>What is at the most northern/southern point? Can you locate (find) Asia? Africa? Where do we live? Look for children's use of the globe, ability to locate continents, countries and use key vocabulary.</i></p>	
	<p>Find It! Using an Atlas suitable for KS1, use a world map and the differentiated Mapping The World Activity Sheet, children to locate and colour code the main continents different colours and oceans. <i>Where is Asia? Africa? Australia? What are the oceans called?</i></p> <div style="display: flex; justify-content: space-around;"> <div data-bbox="213 1572 568 1711"> <p> Children fill in the gaps for continent and ocean labels with word bank and initial letters given.</p> </div> <div data-bbox="612 1572 967 1648"> <p> Children label the continents and oceans independently.</p> </div> <div data-bbox="1011 1572 1366 1711"> <p> Extend to label the continents, oceans, north and south pole and draw on the line of the equator.</p> </div> </div>	
	<p>View It! Show the correct labelling and colour coding using the Mapping The World Presentation taking responses from the children to create a complete map. View the Nasa Earth Observatory Website or the Nasa Visible Earth website to look at further satellite images as a class. Encourage children to ask questions about what they see.</p>
